What is the questionnaire about?

Your child was selected to participate in the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA), a research study which mainly focuses on the scientific literacy of students who are 15 years old, but which also includes an assessment of mathematics and reading. The study is organised by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) and it surveys pupils from about 70 different countries.

In the PISA study, pupils are asked to answer questions concerning scientific, mathematical, reading, and problem solving literacy, and to provide information on their background, beliefs and opinions on issues that generally relate to science, schooling and their careers.

As part of the study, we are also surveying pupils' parents on a number of similar topics including:

- Information about the student and the family
- Your child's school
- Your child's educational pathway
- Your views on science and the environment
- Background information

The information you provide will be extremely valuable in building up a picture of how scientific literacy develops in pupils and what influences its development.

When I am asked about science, what should I think about?

For the purpose of this questionnaire, science refers to the skills and knowledge acquired in subjects like physics, chemistry and biology and general science.

Who should complete this questionnaire?

This questionnaire should be completed by a parent (or jointly by both parents) or other primary carer of the student. To make the wording of the questions simple, the student who brought this questionnaire home is often referred to as 'your child'.

We ask you to respond to all the questions you feel comfortable answering. There are no right or wrong answers and we assure you that your responses to this questionnaire will be kept confidential.
